Fellow Boaters,

We're well into October, and I'm realizing that, while the boating season is typically over for me, for some this may be an ideal time to get out and go boating. This may still be a good time to do some fishing, and some folks may cherish the solitude of anchorages that aren't crammed with people. This time last year, we talked about boat maintenance, and I still think that's important. We all need to know a little about winterizing our boats and doing the annual things that keep our engines and other boat systems healthy. We have classes and seminars that we can present to help educate you on that.

For those that are continuing to get out on the water into the fall, or perhaps even year round, weather becomes something we should be more aware of. It's important to have a decent understanding year round, but in the summertime the temperatures are warm and the weather in the PNW is usually pretty fantastic. The Fall and Winter in the PNW can bring storms and prolonged weather that's not very conducive to having your boat out on the water. This is when it's very important to pay attention to the forecast, know how to read and understand it, and know how to read and react to the weather in real time. This requires a good understanding of what causes weather, and how it can impact your area. The weather class teaches you about high and low pressure systems, warm and cold fronts, and how those impact local weather. It even talks about severe weather systems like hurricanes, and the best actions to take if you end up near one. We're lucky that we really don't have to worry about hurricanes here in the PNW, but Helene and Milton are good reminders that there are parts of the country where you need to look out for them. And even though we don't get hurricanes here, we can get some nasty storms. So, if you haven't already taken it, or even if you have, consider reaching out to see if we can get enough students to justify setting up a weather class.

Finally, we've been struggling to get students into our ABC classes. We try to offer it at least twice a year, and we recently held the October class. It was small, but we had two people pass with flying colors (Geret and Sally). It was a good class and I think it highlights the value of the more detailed learning that comes from the in-person, real-time, instructor led class. Geret has been boating most of his life, so he's not an inexperienced boater. The class was a refresher for him, and it showed. But he still learned a few things of value, and he got to enjoy quality time with his wife Sally at the same time. If you know anyone getting into boating, or even experienced folks, please encourage them to get into some of our classes. If they have their Boater Education Card, they would still benefit from taking the Boat Handling Class. I think I already said that I took the class last year, four years after purchasing my boat and joining the Squadron, and I've taught the Marine Navigation class twice. The Boat Handling class was challenging, and the test was hard. There's a lot to learn there, including what to do if you do get caught in bad conditions, and how to avoid it. We had to cancel the Boat Handling class for the fall for lack of enough students, but we'll schedule it again for the Spring. Please consider it.

Boat Handling: How the heck do I get this boat to do what I want?

Marine Navigation (aka Piloting): How to get from here to there without running into something.

Weather: Look to the clouds, wind and temperature for safe boating weather.

Cold-Weather Boating: Staying Safe in Chilly Waters

Last month, we shared tips for preparing your vessel to endure the winter months for those of us who store their vessels for the season. This month's article is dedicated to those intrepid boaters who thrive on enjoyment of boating during our cold season in the Pacific NW. For the adventurous, cold-weather boating can offer solitude, beautiful winter landscapes, and less crowded waterways. However, it also comes with its own set of challenges. Cold-water boating demands extra preparation, knowledge, and respect for the elements. Here's what you need to know to stay safe and enjoy your time on the water during the colder months.

Dress for Survival, Not Just Comfort

When boating in cold weather, it's critical to dress appropriately. Unlike summer boating, cold conditions require specialized clothing to ensure safety:

- **Layering:** Start with moisture-wicking base layers to keep sweat off your skin, followed by insulating layers to retain warmth, and a waterproof outer layer to block wind and water.
- Avoid Cotton: Cotton holds moisture and looses insulation properties when wet. Stick to materials like wool, fleece, or synthetics that retain heat even when damp.
- PFDs: Always wear a life jacket, ideally one designed for cold-weather use. These often include extra thermal protection, making them essential in preventing hypothermia if you fall overboard.

(Pro Tip): Consider investing in a survival suit or dry suit, which provides full-body thermal protection and is buoyant. These suits are essential for those boating in areas with frigid water temperatures.

The Threat of Cold-Water Immersion

Falling into cold water can be deadly. Understanding the body's response to cold-water immersion can help boaters react effectively in an emergency:

- Cold Shock Response: Upon falling into cold water, your body may react with an involuntary gasp reflex, which can cause you to inhale water. This is often followed by hyperventilation and loss of muscle control.
- **Hypothermia:** Prolonged exposure to cold water reduces body temperature. Hypothermia can set in quickly and be fatal if not addressed promptly. It's important to know the signs: shivering, confusion, slurred speech, and loss of coordination.
- The "1-10-1" Rule: This survival rule is helpful for boaters: you have 1 minute to control your breathing after falling into cold water, 10 minutes of meaningful muscle use to self-rescue, and 1 hour before hypothermia becomes life-threatening.

(Pro Tip): Practice cold-water survival techniques with your crew so everyone knows what to do if someone goes overboard.

Equipment and Vessel Preparation

Your boat and gear need to be up to the task of winter conditions. Here are key considerations:

- **Check the Weather:** In colder months, weather can be more unpredictable. Make sure you check multiple forecasts and be ready to alter plans if conditions look dangerous.
- Battery Maintenance: Cold temperatures can affect your boat's battery performance. Ensure your battery is fully charged and carry a backup if possible. *Continued on Page 11*

- Fuel Management: Engines may need longer warm-up times, and cold weather can affect fuel consumption, so plan for extra fuel to avoid running out on the water.

- **Partial Winterizing Your Boat:** Even when you're actively boating, partial winterization can help prevent damage. Flush your engine with antifreeze and check that bilge pumps are working efficiently to prevent freezing.

(Pro Tip): Carry a toolkit and extra supplies such as blankets, flares, emergency rations, and a portable heater for unexpected breakdowns.

Know the Signs of Ice Formation

In regions prone to freezing, ice can be a serious hazard. Whether you're boating in a coastal area or an inland lake, knowing how to navigate around ice is crucial:

- **Spotting Ice Hazards:** Look for patches of smooth, glassy water, which may indicate thin layers of ice. If you notice ice forming on your vessel, it's a sign that temperatures are dangerously low.
- **Avoiding Ice:** Always maintain a safe distance from ice floes or edges, as they can damage your hull. In some cases, you may need to plan an alternate route or head back to shore sooner than planned.

(Pro Tip): Never break through ice with your boat. Even small impacts can cause significant damage and put your vessel at risk of sinking.

Emergency Preparedness and Communication

Staying connected and prepared for emergencies is critical during cold-weather boating:

- **VHF Radio and GPS:** Ensure your VHF radio is working properly and keep it within easy reach. A GPS or chart plotter is equally important for tracking your position, especially in low visibility conditions.
- File a Float Plan: Always inform someone on shore of your route and expected return time. This simple step can save precious time in the event of an emergency.
- First Aid Kit and Emergency Blankets: Pack a well-stocked first aid kit with items for treating cold exposure, such as thermal blankets and chemical heat packs. It's also a good idea to include extra food and water, as cold-weather conditions may delay rescue times.

(Pro Tip): Consider carrying a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB), which sends a distress signal to emergency responders via satellite if you're in trouble.

While cold-weather boating offers unique rewards, it also requires more thorough preparation and respect for the dangers that cold temperatures pose. By dressing appropriately, preparing your vessel, and understanding the risks of cold-water immersion, you can safely enjoy the tranquility and beauty that off-season boating brings.

I hope that you have had the opportunity to enjoy a great summer and fall as we have, and we look forward to sharing sea stories with all of you at our next meeting.

BOATING SAFETY 4 KIDS REACHES ALMOST 200 KIDS

"If the parents want to be MELLOW, dress the kids in YELLOW, Life Jackets that is," the new slogan from new helper Nancy Ringstad from the Tacoma Squadron. The Fall Festival at Fishermen's Terminal on Saturday, September 28 welcomed the America's Boating Clubs of Snohomish County, Everett, and Tacoma Squadron's to teach Boating Safety 4 Kids to 64 kids coming from 48 families. This is one of the seven events we did this year that reaches a lot of kids coming from boating families.

The helpers from Everett were Linda Martin, Brian Rachal, Danny Daniels and Claire Greer. The helpers from Tacoma were Larry and Jill Warren, Goeff and Nancy Ringstad and David and Paulette Sitzenstock.

Each kid with their parents learned about choosing a life jacket, how Puget Sound water feels and how hard it is to buckle a life jacket buckle and finally how to throw a line to someone who falls overboard. When they completed all three stations the family received a PFD Puzzle Storybook, and the child received a give away item.

I took some time the day after to see where we were in reaching the kids this year and who helped. We had Seven events, taught 191 kids, with 18 helpers from four squadrons in D-16. We had ten (10) helpers from Everett, six (6) from Tacoma, one from Seattle and one from Bellevue.

There are possibly two more events where we can reach the families in the Everett/Mill Creek area. The Holiday at the Bay at the Everett Marina and the Santa Parade in Mill Creek, both on the same day, December 7th. Our families came from twenty cities, plus unincorporated Snohomish County. Over the years our organization has increased the quantity and quality of toys that help low-income families provide a

joyous Christmas for their children. This is all made possible through the generosity of hundreds of people that donate gifts/money and volunteer their services, time and talents.

Biography of a Marine Vessel. Named?

Built by the firm of Randall, Gray & Brent at their shipyard at Rotherhithe, on the river Thames.

Length: 99' Beam: 28' Draft: 12'

Launched: 1789.

Class/Type: Full-rigged 10 gun survey ship, sometimes described as a Sloop-of-war.

Accompanied by a 4 gun survey Brig named HMS Chatham, this vessel left England on 1st April 1791on a mission to take possession of Nootka Sound and conduct surveys of the surrounding coasts and regions. While en route, King George Sound, part of what is now Western Australia, was formally claimed for Britain and some surveys were carried out there before heading for Hawaii and then for mostly as-yet uncharted territories on the eastern edge of the North Pacific Ocean. After extensive (and remarkably accurate) surveying and exploration of those regions and traveling 55,000 miles in 4 years and 8 months, the vessel returned to England in October 1795.

Refitted as a Bomb Vessel and participated in the battle of Copenhagen in 1801, and later that year in the unsuccessful Raid on Boulogne, led by Vice Admiral Lord Nelson. From 1807 to 1815 served as a hospital ship, and then as a prison ship, moored at Woolwich and Deptford on the river Thames, until being decommissioned and broken up at Deptford in 1834.

Anyone who would like a vessel safety check done on their boat,

Answers to the Quiz

HMS DISCOVERY (1789). Captain George Vancouver.

Born in Norfolk, England on 22 June 1757, died of Tuberculosis in Surrey, England, on 12 May 1798, at age 40.

Entered the Royal Navy in 1771 at the age of 13. As a Midshipman he sailed on Captain James Cook's second and third voyages to Australia, first aboard HMS Resolution (1772 to 1775), and then aboard HMS Discovery (not this one!) (1776 to 1780). Spent a number of years serving with the Navy in Jamaica and other parts of the Caribbean and surveyed Port Royal and Kingston.

In 1791 given command of a new purpose-built survey vessel, also called HMS Discovery, and accompanied by HMS Chatham set off on a mission to explore territories which are now Alaska, British Columbia, Washington and Oregon. On 4th June 1792 (which happened to be the 54th birthday of King George III) he landed at a spot which he named New Georgia in honor of the King's birthday and declared possession of the area for the British, naming it Possession Sound. On 4th June 1915 the Daughters of the American Revolution unveiled a large stone inlaid with a bronze plaque at Grand Avenue Park to commemorate the landing at what is now called Everett.

During the nearly five year long voyage he sustained good relations with the indigenous peoples encountered, and also with the Spanish; with whom there had been some initial dispute about possession of what is now Vancouver Island. The causes of scurvy were known about by then and he managed to keep occurrences among his crew very low, losing only 6 men on the entire voyage, largely due to accidents. The maps he made of the Pacific Northwest Coastal areas remained highly regarded for many years for their detail and accuracy in spite of the fact that most of his longitude calculations were eventually shown to be inaccurate by twenty to forty minutes, probably due to inaccuracy of the instruments available at that time rather than incompetence by their users. Many parts of the PNW have names which were given by Captain Vancouver in honor of people he knew.

Mountains were named for:

- 1 Joseph BAKER, Discovery's 3rd Lieutenant, who was the first to spot it.
- 2 Vancouver's friend: Alleyne Fitzherbert, 1st Baron St. HELENS.
- 3 another friend: Rear Admiral Peter RAINIER.
- 4 British Admiral, Samuel HOOD, 1st Viscount HOOD.
