Adopt-A-Street Clean up planned January 18, 2025


The next Adopt-A-Street clean up is planned as follows:

Welcome to 2025. I hope everyone had a wonderful 2024 boating season, and is starting to make plans for the 2025 season. For some boaters, the 2024 season never truly ended, and the 2025 season has already started. For some of us, getting our boat out this time of year is cold and generally unpleasant. I'm one of those, but I do look forward to a nice weekend in March or April that gives me an excuse to get out and run the engines. However, the wintertime for me is an opportunity to focus on learning, and planning for the coming season.

If you read my articles, you've heard some of my stories where I've made use of the things I've learned in some of the classes we offer. You've also heard stories about some of the lessons that I've learned the hard way, as well as experiences I've seen on the water where boaters clearly could benefit from some of our instruction. We've offered a number of classes over the past few years, and struggled to get enough students to fill a class. We've had a lot of conversations about why it's harder to get students, especially since the pandemic, and I have some of my own opinions as well.

One challenge is that there are lots of options available to get basic education for your state required Boater Education Card online. I've spoken to people that would prefer to complete the test online rather than commit to several hours in a classroom. However, every time we've had someone in the class that already had their card, they felt the class really helped them. We've also had people with experience take the class and provide positive feedback about what they got out of it. So if you know anyone getting into boating, send them our way and we'll get them into the ABC class, or the Boat Handling class.

The district is going to continue to offer seminars via zoom this year. Once we have the schedule for that, we'll send it out and keep it up to date in the Pike Pole. We're also planning to work on turning the Marine and Advanced Marine Navigation content into a series of seminars so students can take the entire series and complete the exams, or pick and choose the content they want to learn. This will also give those that have completed the courses an opportunity to see some of the updated portions, without having to sit through the entire course.

We're also talking a bit about the desire to offer on-the-water training. The challenge with planning on-the-water training is having a good boat available that can be used for basic boat handling, which is typically a single engine runabout. If you have one, are willing to let the club use it, and/or would like to participate in that type of training, please get in touch.

STORM STORIES, THE BOMB CYCLONE

On November 19, 2024 there was a *Bomb Cyclone* that whipped through Western Washington like nothing we had ever seen before doing massive damage by downed trees to homes, businesses, cars, buses and power lines. Over half a million homes were without power for days. The highest wind was recorded at the northwest tip of the state at 101 mph. There were two deaths.

After talking with Mark and Norma Covey about the damage done to their 42-foot Ponderosa, a very classic yacht, in Lake Washington, I wanted to find out if anyone else in the Boating Club had a story to tell.

Let's start with MARK AND NORMA COVEY'S STORM

STORY: The *Dragon Lady* was tied to their dock in south Lake Washington near their cabin. The stern lines broke loose in the wind, and the boat swung 90 degrees into the neighbor's dock doing thousands of dollars of damage and only the corner of the swim step of the *Dragon Lady*. It was very difficult for Mark and Norma to get down the neighbor's dock to rescue their boat. Mark has photos but was unable to send them since he doesn't have a computer. Mark and Norma are putting the Dragon Lady up for sale in the spring, if anyone is interested in a live aboard, contact Mark 206-948-0486.

JACK AND RUSS MCBRIEN'S STORM STORY: The wind blew the door off Jack's shed. But his son, Russ, had much more damage. He has property at Lake Conner Park and 400-500 trees went down, 25% of the RV's were damaged and those living there had to be evacuated until they could remove the downed trees and make it safe again. Some trees were three feet in diameter and over

one hundred feet tall.

Over one hundred volunteers came to clean up the park. Russ's fifth wheel was spared but his 2005 Mustang got hit hard right down the middle. See photos.



BRIEN RACHAL'S STORM STORY: His power went out on Tuesday. He drove over power lines Wednesday on his way to work. He took his chain saw with him. In one photo you can see



that someone cut the top off that tree so he could get around it on the shoulder. There was another just past it that he could get around. In the other picture was closer to Granite Falls on Menzel Lake Rd, and that was a large tree that someone

had cut enough room in the middle for one car to get through. On Menzel Lake Rd, the power lines were down in multiple locations. It ended up being Brian and a few other cars making their way into town, and they were able to carefully



drive over them. Brian has lived in his house for 17 years,

and this is the worst he has seen. He was quite surprised that they got his power back as soon as they did. He doesn't have a generator because this has only happened a couple of times, and for him the biggest problem is that his hot



water heater has an electric controller. This time he stopped by his boat and got the small inverter he had. He plugged that into his car and used it to run the hot water heater. He considered himself lucky. He didn't have any damage that cost him anything other than a little time to clean it up. The power came back on Thursday. See photos.

BOB AND LINDA SAVELA'S STORM STORY: Bob and Linda were on Flight 362 back for Maui. Everything was smooth until we came into Seattle and about to land at SeaTac. Suddenly the plane was rocking and rolling, and the rain was coming down

very hard against the plane. The pilot warned them, "We may have a rough landing." Sure enough, as the plane descended it rocked back and forth. Then BOOM!!! The pilot put the plane on the tarmac with a huge bang. As the plane taxied to the gate the pilot got on the loudspeaker and apologized for the rough landing, but he wanted to be certain they'd get on the ground. Everyone on the plane clapped to say the least.



RAY AND ELAINE KEASEY'S STORM STORY: Ray and Elaine were safely enjoying their condo in Carefree, Arizona when they saw on the news what a horrible storm hit the Pacific

NW. They prayed that everyone in Everett would be safe, and they thanked the Lord they were not there.

GARY AND DARCY BAKER'S STORM STORY: A tree from their property fell onto the neighbor's property landing cleanly between their garage and home. It made a huge mess but missed the house, cars and humans! The base of the root ball was over twenty feet across.

Insurance Coverage Update

From Gary L. Baker, D16 Executive Officer

Here is the latest information on the insurance situation.

- A policy of general liability and officers and directors insurance for squadrons, clubs and districts went into effect on December 2. A copy of the policy is not available but will be posted on the national website when received. The policy will state any coverage exclusions.
- There is currently no coverage for on-the-water, cooperative charting, and vessel safety checks activities; but the national officers expect to obtain that coverage by the end of December. They will let us know when that happens.
- 3. There will be no coverage for fundraising activities and holiday parties in third party venues, but ABC | USPS will make available a website portal for districts, squadrons and clubs to purchase event coverage for those activities. The portal is not yet available.
- ABC|USPS will later advise us how to obtain a Certificate of Liability Insurance Coverage to provide to a municipality as a requirement to use their facilities.
